Congressman recognizes Peace Corps volunteers

Rep. Sam Farr, D-Carmel, who served in the Peace Corps in Medellin, Colombia, from 1964-66, honored the organization's 50th anniversary Tuesday. He also introduced a bipartisan bill to establish a commemorative work in the District of Colombia to recognize the founding of the Peace Corps, and honored Central Coast volunteers serving around the world.

In his remarks, Farr highlighted the service of three Peace Corps volunteers from his district. Gabe Lahue, of Aptos, is serving in Paraguay and working with community members on rural agriculture. Marina's Ashley Burke is teaching English at an orphanage in Rwanda. James Staples of Pacific Grove is working on sustainable rural tourism in Guatemala. Currently, 25 volunteers from the region are serving in developing countries.

"Today we honor the nearly quarter-million Peace Corps volunteers who have served America in the name of peace," Farr said. "Over the past 50 years, through war and conflict, the Peace Corps has shown the world a hopeful, uplifting side of America that reflects our fundamental ideals of peace, service, and grassroots development."

President Barack Obama issued a proclamation recognizing the Peace Corps as "an enduring symbol of our nation's commitment to encouraging progress, creating opportunity, and fostering mutual respect and understanding throughout the world."

UCSC graduate programs in game design make top 10 list

UC Santa Cruz's graduate programs in game design were named among the top 10 in the nation by the Princeton Review and GamePro Media. The campus' computer science doctorate and master's programs, along with its master's program in digital arts and new media, earned the school a seventh-place ranking on the survey. This is the first year the Princeton Review, an education services company, has ranked graduate programs in game design.

UCSC is one of only two schools on the West Coast, and the only one in Northern California, to make the Princeton Review/GamePro top 10. Schools were chosen based on a survey conducted in the 2010-2011 academic year of 150 institutions offering computer game design coursework or degrees in the U.S. and Canada. There are currently 22 doctorate students, three master's students, and seven master's students studying games at UCSC.

UC Santa Cruz also offers an undergraduate degree in computer game design. For more information on the game design programs at UC Santa Cruz, visit games.soe.ucsc.edu.
